

Executive Summary 2017 Annual Election

APPROVED Board of Directors August 29, 2017

In 2016, GVR championed Arizona House Bill 2592 to allow for non-profit organizations the opportunity to offer electronic balloting, potentially saving thousands of dollars on annual elections. Governor Doug Ducey signed HB 2592, and AZ Statute 10-3708 (Action by written ballot; electronic voting) went into effect in August.

GVR chose the electronic balloting option, and firm Vote-now.com to administer our 2017 annual election.

Conducting professional elections since 2003, Vote-now.com has over 200 client groups worldwide including Country Clubs, Community Associations, Medical Associations, and Universities. Voting organizations range in size from Industry Boards of Directors of less than 20 members, to Professional Organizations with 60,000+ members.

Vote-now.com provides secure ballot services and reporting with the main focus being to administer each election as an independent third party, oversee the process, and certify the results.

Vote-now.com data is secured using industry-standard 256-Bit SSL encryption for all electronic access and ballot transmissions. In the 2017 election, GVR Members were given the option to receive a paper ballot and voting receipt to validate their submission in real-time. Vote data is redundantly stored in three locations across the U.S. with the primary election server located in a Jacksonville Federal Reserve building, protected by its own police and fire force. Final ballots cast are available for audit or recounts if necessary.

Observations from GVR's 2017 election:

- 1. Requests for duplicate emails (re-emailed link to ballot) are batched and sent out weekly. *Improvement for 2018*: Communicating expected delivery dates to members will improve their experience.
- 2. Requests for paper ballots are batched together, and after the deadline to request them has passed, paper ballots are immediately sent out to the member requesting it.

 Improvement for 2018: Communicating expected delivery dates to members will improve their experience.
- 3. The deadline to request a paper ballot was well publicized and seemingly understood. Similar procedures should be followed in the future for members to request an email with voter code.
- 4. There is the ability for members who own multiple homes to cast their allowed votes at one time. This process worked well for a member who owns 91 GVR properties. *Improvement for 2018*: This option will be available to all members who own multiple properties in the future.
- 5. Outsourcing our annual election saved countless hours of volunteer and staff time.

6.	With one year of experience under GVR's belt, we have a better idea of how to anticipate questions or concerns and expect to make the 2018 elections an even better experience for members.
